## A LETTER FROM THE RECTOR

I recently read a New York Times article from Tariro Mzezewa entitled “Go Ahead. Fantasize”, where the author asks people about the first thing they’ll do once the pandemic is over. Answers ranged from dance parties, to travel, to playdates with the neighbor kids. But even though it sounds like daydreaming, psychologists said looking at our calendar with this kind of anticipation is healthy for us. We need hope:

*“Even though it’s not considered a core symptom of depression, the absence of hope is a common symptom,” said Dr. Toure. Future thinking, or “the imagination and belief that something better is coming,” is crucial to getting through hard times... Holding on to hope, even about one simple, mundane thing can make a big difference, Dr. O’Connor said. “I’m not day dreaming of big trips,” she said. “I can’t wait to hug my mom.”<sup>1</sup>*

Generally, I’m suspicious of the “power” of positive thinking. Jesus cautions us not to worry too much about tomorrow and there’s times where I’ve placed too much hope in the wrong things. But as I think back on the last 10 months, “pondering the lilies of the field” hasn’t necessarily been a fruitful coping mechanism for me either! And maybe that’s ok?

Personally, I can’t wait to see my folks again, travel back to California to say goodbye to my old church, and finally go on a honeymoon with my wife! I’m dreaming of officiating all those postponed weddings and funerals (if you know of anyone who has had to put off such gatherings, let me know and we’ll do it for free!). I want to start up some prayer groups and facilitate a fall retreat. I want to teach Godly Play and have the most raucous summer day camp ever! We don’t necessarily need to “live in the moment” right now. And in fact, the earliest Christians would have laughed at such a sentiment. For them, hope wasn’t just another fantasy. They labored because they knew they weren’t doing it in vain. For them, life is a race that has an end, with the hope of resurrection awaiting them at the finish line.

Our hopes, however great or small, draw us out of our afflictions and into a more ideal future, reframing how we view our circumstances and providing resources to continue to persevere despite all evidence to the contrary. Hope believes that the impossible can become real. And we’ll probably be wrong about our guesses about post-pandemic life, just as much as we’ll be wrong about what’s on the other side of death... but it doesn’t hurt to dream!

We gave a heartfelt thanks to Leif Peterson (Sr. Warden), Grace Benkelman (Jr. Warden), and Heidi Sobczak, whose vestry terms ended this month. Jenanne Solberg, Jan Rayford, and Margaret Anne Payne were elected by acclamation to the vestry, while Suzanne DeVore was appointed senior warden. Officers of the vestry, like the Junior Warden, Treasurer, and the clerk are appointed by the vestry, usually right after the annual meeting. However, given our circumstances, those appointments will be made at our vestry meeting on February 21st. Once these officers have been appointed, we’ll let you know!

## CANDLEMAS

You are invited to bring household candles, lightbulbs, flashlights, or oil to church February 7th, for a Candlemas Blessing.


While Candlemas is officially celebrated on February 2nd, (you might recall that this date is also "Groundhog Day"), we have become accustomed to marking this day together at All Saints’ on the Sunday that falls after February 2nd by blessing the candle oil we use at All Saints’ during our services, as well as a small tea candle for each member of the congregation to take home or have in their car to provide emergency heat in the event you are stranded. (Amazingly, one small candle can provide sufficient warmth if need be.) Churches have historically memorialized this day as the time to bless the candles that will be used throughout the year. Other traditions include candlelight processions and blessing the household candles of parishioners.

Joseph and Mary brought Jesus to the temple, forty days after his birth, to perform the prescribed sacrifice of purification. The Greek name for this day means "the encounter" as the highlight of this story is the meeting between the child Jesus and the aged Anna and Simeon, who both had been waiting for the day they would encounter this special child. You might recall Simeon referring to the Christ child as a "light to enlighten the Nations" which is what inspired the early church to make this day a feast of candles.

Everyone has their own idea about what happens when you die, but this is an excellent book detailing what the Bible and the Christian tradition have to say about death, heaven, and resurrection.


**ASH WEDNESDAY**

## LIVE-STREAM SERVICES

It has been almost a year since the pandemic forced us to move exclusively to virtual worship services for several months. Like many other churches we scrambled to figure out the best way to make our services available online. The quickest, cheapest, and easiest way for us to do that was using an iPhone and broadcasting via Facebook Live. Unfortunately the sound quality was not great, not everyone is comfortable using Facebook, and up until just recently our internet service was horrific, to say the least. We know it has been frustrating for everyone who wants to tune in live to our services. As Fr. Charlie says, we can't do common worship without you.

We are constantly working to try and improve our broadcasts. With the installation of fiber optics, we have hopefully completely solved the problem of the broadcast jumping around, buffering, and stalling. Since we were simultaneously in the middle of a construction project, every week seemed to bring new challenges. We had services outside for many weeks, where the wind, racing motorcycles, airplanes overhead and other noises interfered with the sound quality. Then services moved back into the church, but with no people. Then no lights and no electricity in the sanctuary. When we got electricity back in the building we had no pews or other furniture in the sanctuary and so the sound was bouncing all over the place. The continual problem seems to be with the sound. We now finally have pews (and people !) back in the sanctuary, but still do not have our speakers, organ, microphones, and the rest of our sound system connected yet. We hope when the whole sound system is reconnected this will help solve some of the sound problems.

Recently we purchased a new camera and a laptop which will allow us to broadcast simultaneously to both Facebook and YouTube (as well as other services which we have yet to explore). So far the sound quality on this new camera setup seems to be much better than from the iPhone (which we even tried various microphones with). So we appreciate your patience and comments as we continue to work to get the best broadcast that we possibly can. If you don't like using Facebook, remember that there is always a copy of the service on the home page of our website. It doesn't usually get uploaded until Monday, but the sound quality is usually better than that of the Facebook Live broadcast. And hopefully with this new camera and computer setup we will continue to make progress in improving our live-stream worship services. Of course we look forward to the day when the sanctuary expansion is truly complete and we can all safely gather together to fulfill the goal of our Capital Campaign "That we all may be one".




